Research in Career Counselling

- The overarching theme of research in Career Counselling comprises life-course and counselling in their societal contexts. The areas of research fall into three groups:
- counselling processes and the assessment of their effects
- the function and development of service systems in counselling
- the diversity of individuals and communities' life, education and career paths

Projects Related to the Research Themes

- Group counselling in the facing of change and insecurity: navigating towards stiller waters.
- Educational transitions: Sex, class and family in transition.
- Educational and professional careers of guidance counsellors, and their well-being.
