What expectations? What role?

Expectations → (should be) VERY HIGH Role → (should be) VERY IMPORTANT

 Operating in the context of increasing societal disengagement of many young people across Europe (see more: Eurofound's research on NEETs)



What young people expect from guidance?

- Empowerment and autonomy: throughout whole education
- Learner centred and tailored approach
- Accessible and comprehensible information
- •Transition education work: youth unemployment unprecedentedly high (need to be sensitive to new phenomena, f.ex. internships and jobs in emerging sectors)
- •When considering starting an enterprise
- •When choosing learning or work mobility (in VET more challenging)
- •Reaching vulnerable groups need to be prioritised (especially long-term unemployed, first-time job seekers and disadvantaged young people)



What contribution from youth organisations?

Learning outcomes of non-formal education (NFE):

Knowledge

Soft skills such as interpersonal skills, people management skills, teamwork, leadership skills, planning, project management, organising, co-ordination and problem solving skills.

Values and attitudes: human rights and freedom; democracy; respect; diversity; peace and prosperity; sustainable development; social justice and solidarity

Personality and self-esteem



However...

NFE learning outcomes are underutilised in career management

 there needs to be more awareness among young people themselves, guidance providers and employers about the benefits of NFE for career development

 See the GHK/University of Bath study "Study on the impact of Non-Formal Education in youth organisations on young people's employability" (to be released end of this week)



Some more concrete requests and ideas

- Use of youthful channels, including social networks
- Give role to civil society organisations, associations in order to increase outreach of different groups and ensure peer led processes
- Make possible room for youth participation and representation to improve targeting and expertise
- Partner with existing institutions that work with or for youth local youth clubs, community youth officers, youth information centers, student information centers etc.
